


## HOUSE REMODELING TO COMMENCE



In basketball Gamma Phi so completely dominated B ball that all five B teams made the playoffs. The B-3's sparked by John Berry, '65, won the championship for the second year in a row. Coming in third in the B league were the B-1's.

Beta also dominated volleyball taking a first place in A ball. Again all five B teams made the playoffs with the B-3's taking first and the B-1's taking third.

Beta's pitching staff, consisting of Phil Adamson and Ed McNeil led their teammates to victory as both A and B teams walked off with first place trophies to cinch the intramural trophy.

In track and swimming, Beta took third places having lost many of our best athletes with the graduation of last year's seniors.
