Fraternity Leader Sees Benefit in Ban

NORMAN—The ban of a University of Oklahoma fraternity for alleged hazing will help the overall image of other fraternities, the OU interfraternity president said Wednesday.

"It's kind of a signal to the public that we won't put up with it," said Kevin Kuykendall, president of the Interfraternity Council.

And while alleged hazing was the end for Sigma Alpha Epsilon, OU will be faced with its own legacy next semester—an empty house valued at \$2 million.

Kuykendall said the two-year ban of the chapter, one of the largest and oldest of OU's 26 fraternities, has had an emotional effect in the fraternity community.

"Everybody was kind of sad that a house got banned from campus," he said. But the ban was

understandable because of the university's allegations, he said.

OU officials alleged, among other violations, that members forced gin down a pledge's throat and tied him by his arms to a ceiling beam. The chapter president denied the violations.

The chapter's ban was finalized Tuesday when OU president Richard Van Horn rejected an appeal effort by local fraternity members.

National SAE officials had earlier agreed with the university's allegations and refused to back an appeal. The student affairs office banned the chapter Nov. 8.

The presidents of OU's fraternities were to meet Wednesday night to discuss and reinforce the bans in the student and Greek codes against hazing, Kuykendall said.

The presidents also planned to

talk about the risks of allowing hazing, Kuykendall said.


Despite fraternities' stated goals to end hazing, the negative image they have is "almost impossible to change," Kuykendall said.

About 60 members of SAE living in the house, 730 College Ave., will be forced to leave after this semester, said Larry Naifeh, an OU attorney.

OU officials have not decided what to do with the empty house, which the university owns, he said.

SAE trustees and university officials, however, have agreed that OU will be allowed to use the house for at least three years, Naifeh said.

SAE could start a new chapter after that time and move back into the house, he said.

As you may know, the Beta Corporation also elects 20 trustees annually to oversee the Gamma Phi chapter house. At the Annual Meeting of the Beta Corp. on January 14, 1990, President Beall asked for nominations to serve on the Board of Trustees (not to exceed 20 Trustees) and to meet in January, March, May, September and November annually in Norman and to conduct the business of maintaining the Gamma Phi chapter house. The Beta House could be in better shape—the roof leaks and needs to be replaced (est. \$40,000); the dining room needs tables (10) and chairs (76) so pledges can come to the house on Mondays and Wednesdays for dinner with the members; and thanks to the Sapulpa Beta Club six of the 12 showers in the House again work.

The Beta Mom's Association, Jan Jackson of Norman President, has challenged the Beta alums to match the dollar-for-dollar to buy the table and chairs estimated to cost \$7,500.
