## Meet the Pledges of '91

As it is every year, the future of our house lies in our ability to sign a quality pledge class. Grades are always first and foremost. This year we signed 5 valedictorians which includes 1 of the 90 National Merit Scholars that are in the freshman class this year. Two young men from Norman, Travis Blue and Pete Pappas were co-valedictorians with identical grade points (4.0). Pete was a starter and an All-State honorable mention on the Norman High School State Championship basketball team. The other valedictorians consist of Phillip Dunford, Shawnee, Russ Gammill, Duncan, and Glen Hall, Midwest City. This pledge class has the highest cumulative GPA, and highest ACT average of any pledge class in the last five years. Eight of these young men are in the Honors program. We are expecting great things from this group of pledges.

Three of the pledges are currently UOSA congressional interns, and one is a full member of Student Congress, far more than any other fraternity or sorority on campus. They are Chris Swindle, Tulsa, Pete Pappas, Norman, Kyle Roberts, Broken Arrow, and Phil Dunford, Shawnee. These young men didn't just sign up for the positions, they had to go through an interview process and were appointed to these positions.

As far as athletes, we boast 15 Varsity lettermen,

including 2 starters from the Norman High School State Championship basketball team, and Glenn Hall, a starter from the Midwest City National Championship wrestling team. Many of the other pledges lettered in sports such as baseball, football, basketball, track, golf, soccer and wrestling. Not only did they excel on the field in high school, they are already contributing to the house intramural teams. In the future we expect to see many more great accomplishments. A special thanks to all the alumni who helped by sending in recommendations and donation that enabled us to sign such an outstanding pledge class.

### Donor Dinner Approaching

## De-Bunking a Myth

Make no mistake about it, Beta Theta Pi is in a strong position on the University of Oklahoma campus. Take it from someone who works with OU students six days a week! You can be confident that the young men living at 800 Chautauqua look like Betas, act like Betas and are well respected within the Greek community.

During what was a down year number-wise in OU formal rush the Betas maintained their numbers and pledged first quality rushees the one that had been sought from the beginning. There is a definite emphasis on scholarship in the house and I'm sure Beta will soon move from it's current #2 ranking back into the #1 position where we all expect Beta to be.

So what's the problem? During formal rush there is more negative talk about Beta than any other fraternity. Much of it revolves around the hazing which is said to be involved in the pledge program. Some of the allegations refer to practices dating back over five years and some of the information being dispersed is just not true at all. It's hurting the chapter during formal rush.

"Everyone has always talked about Beta", you say,

"that happened when I was in school." Yes, that's true, but as OU has converted back to a formal system, years of experience in combating negative rush have been lost. In short, the activities are experiencing difficulties in determining the best way of addressing the challenge.

How can we as alums assist the activities in meeting this threat?

1. Spread the word confidently among your associates that the Gamma Phi chapter of Beta is today in excellent shape.
2. Send in rush leads to the chapter and copy the advisory board rush advisor to insure proper follow-up.
3. If you know of families who plan to visit the OU campus, let me know so that we can make certain that a visit to the Beta house is a positive experience. We all know how to put on our proper "rush face" if we receive prior notice!
4. Beta pledgeship is "in-step" with the Nineties. There is no scheduled activity which is emotionally de-grading or physically dangerous taking place. On the other hand the activities are not giving away

Beta badges to anyone who shows up. None of us want to see that happen. If any alum has a specific question about any pledge activity, Please CALL ME. I will make sure you receive a specific answer to your inquiry. A kind of Beta Hotline!

5. Encourage rushees and their families to be careful about accepting rumors concerning Beta pledgship as fact without checking further. We used to say "If you want to know about Beta, ask a Beta."

You would be surprised at the "myths" about Beta pledgship which are circulating throughout the

system. How many of these "myths" were accepted as fact, we'll never really know. I do believe Beta Alums can play an important role in "De-bunking" the myths. If you have any ideas on how we can combat this challenge, I'd be glad to discuss them with you.

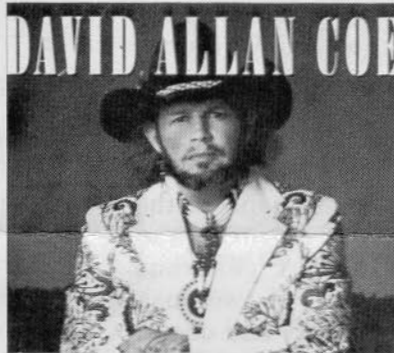
Though the best method of gathering this huge volume of information has not yet been determined, we have been considering asking one member of each
