

Beta Wins UOSA Presidency...Again

The men of Beta Theta Pi are celebrating the election of David Kendrick to the office of the University of Oklahoma Student Association President. For the fourth time in the past five years, the president or vice-president of the student body resides at 800 Chautauqua. This most current grip on student politics was begun in 1989-90 when brothers Randy McDaniel and Richard Walsh held the offices of UOSA president and vice president, respectively. Two years later Chris Williams was elected UOSA vice president running with Alpha Chi Omega member Mendi Sossohan. Last year, brother David Dietert won a hard-fought battle that lasted through one general election and two runoff elections to claim the office of UOSA vice president. After proving our competence in the student executive office, it came as little surprise that Duncan senior David Kendrick won the election this past spring.

David ran with Kappa Kappa Gamma member Terry Carter. Despite entering the race just before the registration deadline

(surprise tactic?), they conducted a well-organized campaign. The campus was expecting a run-off with four tickets on the ballot, but David and Terry were able to gain a majority of the votes cast after just one election.

Prior to becoming student body president, Brother Kendrick established himself as one of OU's elite students. As a National Merit Scholar, David has more than proven himself academically. He was the first initiate in the pledge class of 1990, and has since earned

a 3.70 GPA while striving for a double major in chemical engineering and microbiology. After graduation he hopes to attend medical school and earn a M.D./Ph.D. He served his freshman year as the Junior Interfraternity Council President. This past year he served as the IFC chief justice and was successful in rewriting the IFC constitution. David became involved in school politics his freshman year, when he was appointed to student congress. He has served on stu-

Thieves Strike Rush Team

Beta Rush '93 received a devastating blow last month as thieves targeted the summer rush house, making off with more than \$6000 in loot. According to rush chairman Ross Edwards, the break-in occurred between 11 PM on Friday, July 23rd and 2 AM the next morning. "Apparently, they jimmied one of the back windows, and began moving stuff out the back door," he said. The rush team lost almost all personal items of value, including two stereo systems, two televisions, a fax machine, etc. "This could be a serious set-back for rush this year, but we're doing every-

thing that we can to overcome the loss. IFC is helping us to replace all of our lost records and notes, but it could take awhile," said Ross.

The rush house, located at 1211 Chautauqua, has housed the four rush chairmen, Ross Edwards, Tulsa, '94, Cody Garnett, Oklahoma City, '94, Jacob Piel, Tulsa, '96, and Blake Williams, Lawton, '96 for the past three months. It is from this home base that summer rush has been conducted. Rushees are called, letters are sent, and visits are arranged.

The police report outlines the break-in scenario. The indi-

viduals committing the crime entered initially through a back window, and opened the back door. They began moving items out the back door to a waiting vehicle. At some point, the vehicle became full, because some items were left stacked on the back porch.

This is the second Beta summer abode to fall victim to thieves this summer. In May, Doug Presley, Sand Springs, '93, and Brian Higgins, Tulsa, '93, were relieved of their worldly possessions while they were on a weekend vacation.

Betas Command Respect in Intramurals

The spring semester of 1993 proved to be up to par for Beta. The spring began with the Beta golf team, composed of Don Cochran, Jason Treadwell, Trent McIlhaney, and Brent Benn taking second place in the Intramural golf tourney. Beta "B", comprised of Brad Hunter, Matt Hunter, Jason Benn, and Carey Charvat, came in fourth in the tournament as well.

The basketball team, owners of an 18-1 record and two championships over the previous three years, had a disappointing 4-2 record and had to settle for a share of third-place. Key injuries to Marc Taylor and Jeff Westphalen coupled with the departure of Pete Pappas to play basketball for East Central of the Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference all but doomed Beta in the quest for its third title in four years. Beta, however, fought back from the adversity and knocked off the undefeated Sigma Phi Epsilon team 44 - 43 in the final regular season game before falling to defeat in the campus semifinals. Other members of the Beta A-team were Curtis McCarthy, David Nickel, Robert Penn, Brad Hunter, and Don Cochran. However, Beta roared back later in the semester to win the Kappa Alpha Psi invitational tournament. In their march to the championship, Beta defeated Kappa Alpha, Lambda Chi Alpha, Kappa Alpha Psi, and a Langston University team in '94.

Beta Softball had yet another good year placing fourth in the All Campus Tourney and taking home third place in the fraternity

division. Highlights of the year included exciting victories over the always tough Alpha Tau Omega's (12 - 7) and Delta Tau Delta's (10 - 5) and a tough come from behind 13 - 12 win in extra innings over Phi Gamma Delta (FIJI). The Beta freshman squad showed that Beta will be a force to reckon with on the diamond in 1994 by winning the Residential title. Noah Nadine, Jacob Piel, Lee Hammond, and Speedy Jason Lowery led the crew to the title. With six starters from the A-team coming back, Beta softball has to be an early favorite for the upcoming season.

Jeff Rule won the championship at 150 pounds in the Intramural Wrestling Tournament. Other placers for Beta included Charles Ozan, Kyle Hall, Garrett Barnet, Tom Thompson, Mike Moses, and Chad Wampler. The outstanding performance of these wrestlers, many of which grappling for the first time, gave Beta the fourth place trophy, with six of these placers returning, Beta has outstanding prospects in '94.

The upcoming 1993/1994 school year has the potential to be an outstanding for the Gamma Phi chapter. High expectations in football and softball, coupled with the always tough basketball squad make Beta the early favorite to bring the crown back to its familiar home — 800 Chautauqua.



Kendrick attributes this overwhelming victory to the Beta House. "Without the contributions made by Betas, of time, money, and energy, this election wouldn't have been possible." David would like to especially thank brothers Bob Klabzuba, Fallis Beall, and Tom McCasland, who contributed readily to the campaign. "It really meant a lot to me to know that our alumni are interested in what goes on at 800 Chautauqua, and that they believed in me and the other active members. I don't think that any other fraternity can boast that kind of alumni support."

Beta Sweeps Annual Awards Banquet

As usual, Betas were well represented at this year's Mom's Day Awards banquet. It is at this banquet each year that the Gold Letzeiser award winner and Outstanding Senior man are recognized. For the fifth year in the last six, a Beta claimed one of these two top honors bestowed upon graduating senior men at the University of Oklahoma. Paul Cockrum, '93, a pharmacy student, earned the Gold Letzeiser. Last year, brother Chris Williams won this coveted award. In the three years previous to William's winning, brothers Scott A. Sullivan, '88; Randy McDaniel, '90; and Gene Frieda, '91; earned the title of Outstanding Senior man. Paul Cockrum served as President of the Health Sciences Center's student association while earning a 3.84 in pharmacy. Brother Mike Barnett also was one of 12 Letzeiser Award winners. Mike boasted such honors as PE-ET, Tassels President, and served as Beta's Scholarship Chairman.

Brothers Barnett and Cockrum were not the only Betas honored this spring. James Banta and Toby Owen were two of twenty sophomores elected into Tassels, a philanthropic honor society. Brother Banta will serve as president of Tassels for next year. Brothers Randy McDaniel, Mike Barnett, and Chris Swindle have also served as Tassels' presidents in the past. Brothers Chris Swindle-Manning, Jason Lees and David Kendrick were honored as members of Omicron Delta Kappa, a leadership honor society. These three were also inducted into Mortar Board, which represents the top twenty seniors. Beta was the only Greek organization to have three members chosen for either honor society.

Brothers Jason Lees and David Kendrick also received additional awards. Both men were awarded the "Regent's Award for Outstanding Juniors." Only ten such awards are given on the Norman campus and Betas captured two. Jason Lees was also selected to

PE-ET, comprised of the top ten seniors at the University. Brother Lees was also one of four junior men selected as "Big Man on Campus." Brother Lees was recently elected as Interfraternity Council Vice-President. His accomplishments include IFC Secretary, Beta house treasurer, UOSA Student Congress, Crimson Club, and 1993 OU Dad's Day Chair. No other house on campus can match Beta Theta Pi in continued excellence among its members.

Betas Make the Grade, and History

Betas rallied to win the second semester IFC scholarship competition, edging the Chops by .053 grade points. However, a poor fall showing relegated Betas to the second place position, by .042 grade points. Splitting hairs may be a good analogy for the differences between first and second place this year, but the active members, greatly disappointed by the loss, have vowed to regain the title by a wide margin next year. Scholarship chairman Clifton Bonney said of the next to best finish, "It's no longer good enough to boast about the records of the past. It's time to set some records of our own."

Earlier this summer, IFC Advisor Andy

Longo decided to dispell rumors and eliminate falsehoods about scholarship history among fraternities, a record long disputed by various fraternities, seeking to portray their house as academically strong. Longo researched grade reports for the past forty-five years, and what he discovered leaves no question as to which fraternity is truly the academic stronghold of the Greek system.
