



A YEAR OF BETA DOMINANCE!

Things couldn't be brighter for the men at 800 Chautauqua. Winning grades for the fall semester with a **3.10** made it the 5th semester out of 6 for the men to capture this title. Helping out tremendously, **Mark Bicket, Chris Cross, KW Cryer, Michael Flint, Keystone Hughes, Carter Jennings, Brian McCall, Nathan Merideth, Clark Neely, Timmy Nisbet, Matt Pappas, Kenneth Pope, Zane Weaver, Robbie Crosier, Justin Edmiston, Grant Shawhan, and Jared Storts** all received a **4.0**.

We also received **1st place** in Homecoming-teaming up with the women of Chi Omega, and **2nd place** in University Sing participating with the women of Alpha Omicron Pi. Placing **2nd** in the intramural basketball tournament put the men back into the top 3 behind the Chops

and the Sig Eps, concluding our dominant fall semester.

We entered into the New Year with the election of new officers, bringing new goals and aspirations for the house but keeping in mind our ultimate goal, which was set at the beginning of the year, to win the President's Trophy. On April 2nd, the executive officers attended the President's Trophy Banquet. This application for the award consisted of 4 categories: Academics, Campus Involvement, Community Service and Multicultural Activities. Winning grades in the fall secured the academics section. This year four Beta brothers, **David Proctor** (Big Red Rally), **Grant Jones** (Homecoming), **John**

Simpson (College Bowl), and **Brandon Smith** (Sooner Scandals) all held executive Campus Activities Council chair positions—more than any other fraternity on campus. The new members teamed up with the Salvation Army and put together a 'Trick or Treat' festival, giving inner city children the opportunity to participate in a safe Halloween.

WORK CONTINUES ON HOUSE IMPROVEMENTS

Many thanks to all of you who participated in our 2003-04 Donors Campaign. This year's campaign broke all the records with **264** alumni generously contributing **\$46,745** to the preservation of 800 Chautauqua.

This was easily the most successful campaign since the inception of the Donors program.

John Orr '34, Don Cies '59, Dan Moody '69, Fred Turner '72, G. R. Talley '74 and Mike Scherlag '90

were particularly generous with gifts of \$1,000 or more. The Class of '85 led all pledge classes with 15 donors, followed by the Classes of '74 (14 donors), '71 and '72 (11 donors each) and '63 (10 donors).

Our Donors program funding has facilitated several important chapter house improvements. These include our recent replace-

Well, maybe Socrates didn't actually say it, but it's true. Rushing and signing the best young men at OU ensures that the Beta House will continue to be the best fraternity on campus for years to come.

Although summer is still a few weeks away, plans for summer rush have been underway at the Gamma Phi Chapter for several months. In March, the Chapter elected an outstanding new Rush Team: head rush chairman **Ben Burnett** (*San Antonio '06*), and assistants **Joe Kokojan** (*Hinton '06), **Brad Brown** (*Tulsa '07), and **Trevor Potts** (*Ardmore '07*). The Rush Team plans to host several rushees at the annual Beta Lei function at the end of April, and is excited about shifting summer rush into high gear after the conclusion of the spring semester in May.**

This is also the time of year that Gamma Phi alums and friends are asked to provide their support for rush. As you will read elsewhere in this newsletter, the Chapter is perhaps in its best shape ever, recently winning the prestigious President's Trophy as the best fraternity on campus in 2004. The young men who have been recruited to become Betas over the last several years are now consistently winning grades again – six of the last seven semesters for the first time in almost 20 years. They also hold numerous leadership positions on campus, and are at the tops in intramurals. Beta is once again viewed by most as the best fraternity on campus. Of course, this success would not be possible without strong alumnus support for rush. Fundamentally, rush is the root of success for any fraternity, and that is nowhere better illustrated than with the Gamma Phi Chapter over the last several years. Due to success in rush in recent years, the IFC Scholarship Trophy is now once again becoming a permanent fixture at 800 Chautauqua.

However, success cannot lead to complacency. To maintain Beta's posi-

tion on campus, the Chapter must continue to rush and sign the top young men entering OU. This requires strong alumni support on three fronts.

First, referrals and recommendations of prospective rushees are needed *as soon as possible*. Please take a few minutes of your time to provide us with information on the young men that you know who may be attending OU next fall. Although pledges cannot be signed until the conclusion of formal rush in August, it is essential that the Rush Team has the opportunity to contact prospective rushees during the critical early weeks of the summer. Although complete resumes are preferred for each candidate, a name, high school, approximate GPA, and at least one telephone number where the young man can be reached after May 20, 2004 will do.


Second, strong financial support is the cornerstone of a strong rush. In the past, thanks to the generosity of our



LOOKING BACK

100 years ago (Spring 1904) – The February 18, 1904, issue of the Norman Transcript noted that “A Gamma Phi fraternity has been organized among the boys. This is the first frat. at the University.” Wallace Perry was elected President of the Freshman Class. Five members of Gamma Phi participated in the University Grand Concert. John Darling won the Gold Medal for all-around athlete at the Oklahoma intercollegiate field and track meet in Guthrie.

75 years ago (Spring 1929) – Mrs. Ned B. Miller served as Housemother. Bill Noble was a starting guard on the Sooner basketball team that won the first Big Six championship.

50 years ago (Spring 1954) – Mrs. W. P. Vick served as Housemother. Fred Wewerka was Chapter President. Roger Clark played at No. 2 singles on the varsity tennis team and was half of the team that won the Big 7 Tennis No. 1 doubles crown. In Intramurals, the house won the “B” basketball championship and second place in team table tennis.

25 years ago (Spring 1979) – Oklahoma Sain served the Housemother. Bob Naifeh was Chapter President. The Scholarship Trophy was reclaimed. At the request of the General Fraternity, and with significant assistance from the OSU chapter, the Chapter hosted a Regional Beta Workshop that was attended by the General Secretary. The workshop concluded with the initiation of 21 new members. The living room carpet was removed, and the hardwood floor was refinished.






WOOGLIN SMILES - BENTON C. CLARK III

Benton C. Clark III (1959, #937), currently serving as the co-investigator for the Mars rover missions and chief scientist for the space exploration group at Lockheed Martin, was the subject of an extensive article in the Science & Health section of the March 23, 2004, edition of *The Oklahoman* (formerly known as the *Daily Oklahoman*). The article traced Brother Clark's Oklahoma roots, his growing up in Oklahoma City, and his graduating from OU in 1959 with a BS in Physics. He then obtained a Masters

Degree in nuclear physics from the University of California at Berkley. After a period in the Air Force during which he worked on a program that studied the effects of radiation on astronauts, he moved to New York where he earned a doctorate from Columbia University and met his wife. After their wedding and a short stay in Tulsa, the Clarks moved to Colorado. His younger brother **Jim Clark** (1962, #1038) runs the family jewelry business in Oklahoma City.

ment of the main electrical box (long overdue) and repairs of significant roof leaks at the rear dormer and south hip. With the assistance of the Parents Club, new exterior lighting has been installed on the south and rear facades which illuminates the basketball and volleyball courts. We are also presently proceeding with the installation of "moonlight" effect lighting within the front yard trees and additional flood lights which will better illuminate the portico columns.

Our most recent "surprise" just presented itself - replacement of the house's two hot water tanks, which were originally installed in 1968 and 1983. Installation of new tanks is now underway at a cost of \$11,600.

Additionally, we anticipate making major equipment upgrades in the kitchen this summer (~\$5,000-\$8,000). Other improvements under study include installation of a video surveillance system (~\$10,000), which will deter future recurrences of last fall's unfortunate vandalism incident, and replacement of the kitchen and basement HVAC system (~\$5,000-\$8,000), and yet another major roof repair (~\$13,000). Certainly, other needs are sure to present themselves.

This year marks the 75th anniversary of the completion of our historic chapter house at 800 Chautauqua. Not only is it the oldest fraternity house presently in use at OU, it's a magnificent architectural structure which has virtually defined the Beta experience at OU since 1929. As Gamma Phi alumni, 800 Chautauqua is a special place to all of us. We can take pride that, through alumni stewardship, the Beta house endures and remains a testament to Beta's long tradition of excellence.

Of course, our motivation is not simply preservation of a physical building. Our mission is to ensure that the

Gamma Phi Chapter thrives as an institution at OU which profoundly enriches the university experience of its members. In this regard, the outlook could not be brighter. The Chapter has won grades 5 out of the last 6 semesters. This April, Beta won the prestigious President's Trophy for Outstanding Fraternity at OU. Betas broadly occupy positions of leadership and campus involvement, exemplified most recently by the Beta Theta Pi - Kappa Alpha Theta sweep of *Sooner Scandals*. Nation-

wide, Gamma Phi is the largest chapter within the Beta Theta Pi General Fraternity. Stated simply, Beta sets the standard at OU.

As good as its present situation may be, Gamma Phi is not content with the status quo. The Chapter will continue to pursue ever-present opportunities for improvement with the goal of widening the distance between Beta and its rivals. For example, the Chapter recently adopted sweeping changes to its residency rules and procedures which are intended to assure that at least 72 men live in the chapter house. Gamma Phi now turns its attention to summer rush with the objective of decisively dominating its rivals. As always, academic excellence will remain a priority.

Thanks again to all of you who have generously supported Gamma Phi and made this good news possible. With your continued loyalty and assistance, there will be more to come.






